The K.E. College Blood Donors' Club was founded with the primary goal of providing blood for transfusions to patients in urgent need. By donating blood, we contribute to the continuity of life and bring hope and relief to the families of those facing critical medical situations. Our college's strategic location near the Medical College Hospital in Kottayam District, as well as several esteemed specialty and super-specialty hospitals, positions our Blood Donors Club as a crucial resource in emergencies.

Our implementation strategy involves acting as an intermediary between donors and patients. Hospitals or other parties in need officially contact the college office and we then mobilize appropriate donors to provide the necessary blood. In 2023, an automated web page was developed to enhance the efficiency of the club's operations. The web page allows students to register and log in by providing their details, ensuring quick identification of the required blood group. Additionally, the club regularly observes Blood Donor Day to raise awareness about the vital need for safe blood and blood products and to express our gratitude to the voluntary, unpaid blood donors whose life-saving contributions make a significant impact.

Lifesaving Hand on World Blood Donor Day

In a remarkable display of community spirit and medical charity, *Chir@h*along with the NCC Cadets and blood donors' forum marked World Blood Donor Day on June 14th, 2018, by organizing a blood donation drive at Matha Hospital, Thellakom. 






Blood Donation During COVID-19: A Beacon of Hope



Blood Donor Club Automated Web Page



Counselling Cell of the HEI, along with the department of Psychology, offered one on one counselling sessions to students to cope up with personal issues, anxiety and other emotional challenges. Regular workshops and seminars are conducted by the cell for both students and parentsfor promoting themental health awareness. For the smooth functioning of the cell, regular appointments of faculty coordinators of various departments and professional counsellors from various reputed institutions are conducted.

Our counselling services extend beyond the campus, as we actively assist neighbourhood villagers seeking mental health support. We also provide psychological assistance to teachers from nearby schools, who are dealing with students facing behavioural disorders, learning disabilities and poor academic performance.

The postgraduate students of Psychology are also integral to our counselling efforts. During the recent floods, they made significant contributions by visiting affected families and offering much-needed support. The department has successfully assisted numerous individuals dealing with family issues and marital discord.

Activities of the Counselling cell

Counselling Service in an educational institution aims to offer a diverse range of support options, leveraging unconventional therapies to address students' needs in innovative and holistic ways. To attain the aim, the cell along with department of Psychology, organizes various activities every year.

Suicide Prevention Day

As per the statistics of WHO, close to 800000 people die of suicide every year. Furthermore, for each suicide, there are more than 20 suicide attempts. Suicides and suicide attempts have a ripple effect that impacts on families, friends, colleagues, communities and societies. The fact is that suicides can be prevented. Much has been done to prevent suicide at individual, community and national level. With this view, WHO announced September 10 as Suicide Prevention Day. The Day is observed annually on September 10th and it aims to raise awareness about suicide prevention and to promote mental health support.



The Department of Psychology,in association with K.E. Counselling Cell, conducted an awareness program about suicide prevention in the academic year 2018- 2019. 
Webinar On Safety and Security Among Youth


Webinar on "Parenting: An Art and Challenge During the Time of Pandemic"





Counselling Room

K.E.Counseling cell is integral to help students to achieve academic success, maintain emotional well-beingand prepare for future challenges, both in their personal lives and in their careers.By addressing a range of academic, emotional, social and career-related issues, providing essential support that can help students to navigate the challenges of their educational journey.



SOCIAL EMPOWERMENT

Social empowerment of students focuses on enhancing their ability to participate effectively in their communities and society through their holistic education. By integrating the provisions of food, clothing, medical aid, family adoption and educational support to the students of K.E college and needy people of the nearby community *Chir@h* effectively build a path towards a better future.

Free lunch

Chir@h offers free lunch to the deserving students of the college. This scheme was launched with an objective that there will not be any student in the college, who suffers fromhunger, thereby making a hunger free campus. Food vouchers distributed can be redeemed by the students at the college canteen at their convenience. During the academic year 2018-19, two students benefitted out of this scheme.

Helping Hand to Students in Need

Chir@h has provided financial assistance to poor students of the college. An amount of Rs.400 will be provided to deserving students each semester. The assistance will be given for the purchase of essential study materials like text books, note books, records etc. During the academic year 2018-19, Rs.25912 was given for the purchase of study materials. A total of sixtyone students benefitted out of this scheme.

The HEI in a heartwarming act of solidarity and support, has provided a helping hand to a 2nd year Zoology student facing housing challenges, by donating Rs. 5000 towards the construction of his house. This generous contribution exemplifies the core values of compassion and community spirit that the institution upholds.

Through their generosity and compassion, Chir@h and the students have shown that true education goes beyond academic achievements. It encompasses the development of character and the willingness to support one another in times of need. This initiative not only provided immediate relief, but also strengthened the bonds of friendship and cooperation within the student body, paving the way for a more inclusive and supportive community.

Financial Assistance Scheme

Due to the Covid lock down scenario, the students were not present in the college and hence the annually collected amount of money was given to a non-



teaching staff (part time) of the College, who was in dire need of financial assistance.

During 2020-21, an amount Rs. 8500 was utilized for the charity activities under the aegis of Chir@h.

- Food Assistance: A total of Rs. 4,500 was spent on food, benefiting a total of three students.
- Medical Treatment Aid: Rs. 2,000 was allocated to assist one family with medical expenses.
- Education Support: Rs. 2,000 was provided for educational support to one student.

Christmas Gift

Chir@h is also distributing grocery kits to the financially disadvantaged students of the college during the Christmas time. As part of the Christmas celebrations, the unit has provided gift kits to ten poor students of the college. The kit included 5 Kg rice and other provisions. An amount of Rs.5258 was spent for the purpose

During the Academic Year 2021-2022, the *Chir@h* in association with Vincent De Paul Society allocated funds across various support categories to aid our students in need.

- Food Assistance: A total of Rs.1430 was spent on providing food to our students.
- Medical Treatment Aid: The initiative provided Rs.1000 in medical treatment aid to one family in need.
- Education Support: Significant support was provided for educational purposes. A total of Rs.5820 was spent on twelve students.

This expenditure reflects the Society's commitment to supporting families and addressing their critical needs throughout the year.

During the academic year 2022-2023, the HEI has undertaken several impactful initiatives:

Medical Assistance: Provided medical aid to students with chronic illnesses.

Supplied a hearing aid worth Rs. 20,000 to a student with hearing impairment.

Supported a previous student with Rs. 10,500 for surgery.

Assisted an elderly person outside the campus with Rs. 2,500 for treatment.



Educational Support: Spent Rs. 3,550 on educational purposes, ensuring that students from economically backward classes have access to necessary learning facilities.

Food and Nutritional Aid:Allocated Rs. 6,000 to provide food for an adopted student, ensuring their nutritional needs are met.

Family Support:Extended a helping hand to an adopted family with Rs. 5,000, assisting them in their day-to-day needs.

The HEI, Mannanam, exemplifies the spirit of charity and community service. By addressing the educational, medical and basic needs of the economically disadvantaged, the society not only uplifts individuals, but also strengthens the community as a whole. The ongoing support from the college's teacher-student fraternity and other associated bodies ensures that the society can continue its vital work, providing hope and assistance to those who need it the most.

Food Collection Service

Chir@h, in association with students of Jesus Youth, have embarked on a noble initiative aimed at providing support to the underprivileged and sick people, along with their bystanders, at Kottayam Medical College. This initiative conducted, in collaboration with the Navajeevan Charitable Society, exemplifies the spirit of compassion and community service. The students and staff of the college contribute food packets, every Wednesday which are then distributed to the needy.

The primary objectives of this food collection service are to provide nutritious meals to the poor, the sick individuals and their bystanders at Kottayam Medical College, to foster a sense of social responsibility and community service among the students and staff of KE College.

Prior to the collection day, the Jesus Youth team spreads awareness among the students and staff about the upcoming food collection. This is done through posters, announcements, and social media. The collected food packets are gathered, sorted, and packaged by the Jesus Youth volunteers. This ensures that the food is safe and hygienically packed for distribution.Once the food packets are collected and sorted, they are transported to Kottayam Medical College with the help of the Navajeevan Charitable Society and distributed. The initiative has witnessed significant participation from the college community, resulting in participation than 100 food packets been collected and distributed each week. Hello English

Department of English of the HEI organized a training programme titled *Hello English* in association with St Joseph's UP School, Mannanam. Sri Jojan Joseph, Headmaster of theschool inaugurated it on 05-09-2018 at 03.00 pm. Fr Joby Joseph, Vice Principal & Coordinator and Ms Chinchu Rose George, Asst. Coordinator were also present during the inaugural function. English language, primarily spoken English, has been a hard nut to crack for the students as well as teachers of government or aided schools. However, the scenario has started showing signs of change in the primary classes in Kerala with the introduction of the revised curriculum and textbooks. Our students master-planned the programme focusing on the integral development of these poor village children. It was a one-week training programme from 3 to 4 pm. The confidence level of English usage among the UP-School learners had gone up considerably. Some of the children had started creative writing in English in the form of stories, poems and other forms. The programme had motivated the students and gave them tremendous confidence to carry out the teaching-learning process better in their classrooms. Proficiency in



English is still a distant dream for most of the students in the school. However, Our Third Year BA Literature students strived hard to make this teaching-learning activity joyful and pleasant experience to the learners. Henceit is observed that most of the UP-school students were competent users of their mother tongue.

The Language Enrichment and Talent Search (LETS)

The Language Enrichment and Talent Search (LETS) program was held on 2nd February 2019 at the New Seminar Hall of the institution. This one-day event aimed at enhancing the language abilities and communication skills of school students, providing them with valuable training that would support their academic careers, leadership development, and personal growth. The program also addressed ongoing environmental issues, fostering a sense of responsibility among the students. It was a paperless training initiative, underscoring the importance of sustainable practices.

The LETS program was academically significant as it focused on improving the language skills and communication abilities of school children from grades VII to XII. The program was designed to prepare these students for future academic challenges by offering leadership training, group discussion opportunities, and skill development sessions. Socially, the program brought together students from different schools, creating a platform for collaboration and mutual learning. Environmentally, the program's paperless approach highlighted the importance of reducing waste and adopting eco-friendly practices.

The event was sponsored by the CMI Educational Institutions and the College Management of Kurikose Elias College. A total amount of approximately ₹88,400, including registration fees, was granted for the successful execution of the program. The program saw active participation from 275 school students from various schools within and around the Kottayam district. Additionally, 80 students from the Department of English at K E College also participated in the event. Faculty members from the Department of English, as well as parents and teachers of the school children, were present, contributing to the program's success.

The event was a collaborative effort involving both external and internal entities. Externally, the program was organized in collaboration with the CMI Educational Institutions, which included various schools. Internally, the Music and Dance Club of K E College played a key role, especially in organizing cultural activities and the Spot-Choreography competition, which was one of the highlights of the event.



LETS was officially inaugurated by Fr Joshy Chereramkuzhiyil CMI, Principal of KCMT, Chethipuzha, with Dr Antony Thomas, Principal of K E College, presiding over the meeting. Dr Sujarani Mathew, Head of the Department of English, delivered an inspiring felicitation address.

The program included two main input sessions. The first session focused on language skills and was conducted by Mr Ajith P C, Assistant Professor on contract at St Thomas College, Palai. The second session was dedicated to enhancing communication skills and was delivered by Mrs. Mariya, Assistant Professor on contract, Department of English, St Thomas College, Palai. Both sessions were well-received and provided valuable insights to the participants.




Visit to Cancer Patients Home

Sevagram Special School Visit






Flood Relief Efforts for Koottikkal Panchayat, Mundakkayam
